COMMENTS: Rodneya Hart is requesting a Reconsideration. She stated a tree fell on her home on 7/7/2018, and she lost most of the paperwork during the repair. They were living in a hotel for 4 months during the repairs. She withdrew from graduate school and experienced other trauma that led to being medicated for depression. She is the financial provider for her household, as her husband is disabled. In October 2018, she lost her job and was interviewing for out of state jobs. She began new employment on 1/2/2019, while still being a member of the LA State Arts Council. After starting her new job, she didn't have the time off to attend the Art Council meetings. She resigned from the council on 11/7/2019 and did not realize she still needed to file PFD statement. Her husband, usually takes care of the taxes in a timely fashion. He did not complete the 2018 taxes until 11/20/2019, as he is disabled, and she have had to take on tasks he historically would complete without her.

Tracy M. Barker & Board of Ethics et al:

These are the series of extenuating circumstances that predicated my early departure from the LSAC. Mostly three contributing factors, disabled husband, and traumatic and meaningful life events contributed to my tardiness timeline.

A tree Fell on the house, July 7, 2018. There may have been papwerwork that I shoud lhave kept up with but much was lost in the repair. We were out of our home and living in a hotel for 4 months. At this time I was suppoed to be starting graduate school but had to withdraw. I experinaced other personal trauma that led to being medicated for depression.

I am the breadwinner for my household. My husband is disabled.

Then in October 2018, I lost my job. I had to scrable to find another position. Worked full time with a nonprofit that ended up not working out. I had job interviews in Cincinnatti and Pittsburg hoping that we can find something that would pay the bills.

In August I started intevelwing for the position as Division Director at Capitol Park Museum under the DCRT office of State Museums. There were 3 additional interviews that later lead to my start date of January 2, 2019. I was still a member of the Louisiana State Arts Council at that point.

Soon after I started the position, we had an LSAC meeting. I was not given the time off by my supervisor to attend, I had just started this job and did not have any time saved, so I missed the meeting. When I talked to Cheryl Castille about this, she said she would speak with Julie Sampson about the importance of allowing me to attend the quarterly meetings and remain active with the council.

This was an ongoing conversation where Cheryl, Kristen, and I were supposed to speak with my supervisor about my attendance, but it did not come to fruition. Eventually, I told Cheryl that I would leave the council because I could not pull my weight in attendance and did not want to be an unreliable member. This conversation occurred around June. She asked me to hold off from withdrawing. Nothing changed in the coming months. On 11/7/2019, I officially resigned from the council and thought all of my responsibilities in association with it would also go away.

My husband, Phillip Hart, usually takes care of the taxes in a timely fashion. He did not complete the 2018 taxes in 2019. He is disabled, and I have had to take on tasks he historically met without me. Through the depression and physical pain, he cannot reliably pay the bills on time, complete most household tasks, and now we are outsourcing the taxes.

- o We did finally file our 2018 taxes on 11/20/2019

Please consider these things in assessing a possible waiver for the fee and reinstatement of good standing with the State.
